

THE RICHARD WASHBURN CHILD ESTATE

George Gershwin was a friend of the Estates at Cohasset, a Toll Brothers Development Stampleman family and he reportedly wrote of luxury homes.

The house was built in 1911. It was a two-story colonial revival stone veneer and wood-shingled building. Also on the property were numerous outbuildings including a barn, greenhouse, teahouse, pool and cabana. The estate was originally called "the Churches."

The original owner, Richard W. Child, was an author and diplomat. He attended Harvard University and received an honorary Doctor of Laws from the school in 1924. In 1919, he became editor of Colliers Weekly. He served as U.S. Ambassador to Italy from 1921 until 1924 and was the US chief representative at the Geneva and Lausanne Conferences in 1922 held by the League of Nations. As an author, he collaborated with Premier Benito Mussolini on his autobiography and was decorated by the Italian Government.

The second owner of the estate was Robert K. Eaton and in 1933 his widow sold the property to Samuel There were 5 children in the family. At the time C. Stampleman of New York. At that time, the of his death in 1988 the property consisted of estate consisted of 50 acres.

Razor Co. from 1934 through 1938. He formerly had been president of the Auto Strop Safety Razor Co. that had merged with Gillette in 1931. He was "prominent in the safety razor industry" and he held a patent with Joseph Muros for Gillette concerning the automatic removal of used razor blades from the razor. Stapleman was denied entry into the Cohasset Golf Club, so he built a 6-hole golf course on the property. In the 1930s, Stampleman sponsored a baseball team, the Gillette Blue Blades, which played at the Beechwood Ball Park. Members of the team included manager, Frank Collins, and players Bob Leonard, Mickey McNeal, Fred Ahearn, Bill Enos (scout for the Boston Red Sox), Jerome Lincoln (father of Roger Lincoln (Fire

Stampleman's daughter married into the Gershwin family. A rare "piano roll" for the player piano of Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue" was found at the house after the property was sold and the roll was returned to the Stampleman

The property was sold to John A. Hayes and his wife, Ann, in 1946. He was a Harvard graduate and received his law degree from Boston University. He was a founding member and president of the South Shore Playhouse Association. In 1961, along with Attorney Blake Thaxter, Edward Rowe Snow and others, John helped to form the Cohasset Tennis and Squash Club located on Cedar Street. It was the first permanent, all-metal construction, indoor tennis club on the South Shore.

Stampleman was the President of the Gillette Safety His wife, an avid gardener, died in 2007. The property was sold in 2003 and after a couple of stalled attempts to develop it, Toll Brothers bought the property, razed all of the buildings on the site, and are now developing it.

> The existing extant buildings connected to the estate are 117A Beechwood Street once the guest house, now owned by Lawrence McCarthy, and 159 Beechwood Street once the caretaker's house purchased by Joseph Bellefontaine. He was caretaker of the estate and purchased 4.5 acres including the house and land in 1949. He ran a chicken farm with as many as 3,500 chickens between 1949-1975. His son, John, and his family continue to live on the property.







DIARY OF DRUSILLA SNOW PERCIVAL 1857 - 1858



This is the thirty-second installment of Drusilla's diary, written while crossing the Atlantic on the bark Vesta and on the Pathfinder during the return journey. (Punctuation, capitalization, and spelling are as they appear in the diary.)

Friday, May 14th, 1858

Calm or nearly so all night but this morning is very fine, Cape Palos just in sight, wind West very light with a prospect of being becalmed.

There is a little breeze stirring now, be we were becalmed all the forenoon it is from the SWest.

At 6 o'clock it is a dead calm, not a breath of air, there is not a ripple on the surface of the water. We are opposite the port of Cartagena about 10 or 12 miles from land.

Saturday, May 15th, 1858

Towards morning we had a little wind from SWest and remains about the same this morning very pleasant this morning at 8 o'clock exchanged signals with an American Bark bound East - think it was the Jet Lee from N York, if so there were some of our Cohasset friends on board. We did not come near enough to speak her. She had a fair wind.

At 12 o'clock wind increased to a wholesale breeze had it been fair we should have gained rapidly towards Gibralter as we sailed at the rate of 11 knots an hour and had it been fair, should have gone much faster at 4 o'clock we tacked ship near Cape de Gat, on the Spanish coast. fine weather today.

Sunday, May 16th, 1858

Yesterday afternoon saw two American
Barks one bound West, the other East,
the latter had a Lady on Board, probably the Captain's wife.

This morning is very fine, we have the smell of blossoms again, from the land, we have only a light breeze now from SWest and a head sea, a great number of vessels in company bound West this is the 10th day of head wind. Captain Kallock keeps up good spirits yet, we regret our ill luck on his account, but it does not affect our interest as it does his, although we are impatient to get home.

Monday, May 17th, 1858

As pleasant this morning as anyone could wish, and a fair wind though light, it changed East last night and now we are heading on course towards G- for the first time for 10 days, with a wholesale breeze we should reach the straits tonight probably.

We are not gaining very fast as the breeze is light, we may get down tomorrow morning There is a large fleet heading for G- the mountains covered with snow which we saw as we passed up are distinctly seen, they present the same appearance at all seasons of the year.

Tuesday, May 18th, 1858

We were becalmed last night and did not gain much we were opposite Malaga this morning with a light breeze from the East. another pleasant day. I think we have seen more pleasant weather since we left Malta, than during the rest of the voyage.

Going to sea is not so dreadful as some people imagine after all, I mean in pleasant weather. We are some distance from Malaga, yet there is much

to remind me of little Johnny and our pleasant visit there.

It has been moderate all day but there is a little breeze, now, which is favorable for us. We shall stop by G- a few hours for fresh provisions.

Wednesday, May 19th, 1858

This morning at daylight we were about 5 miles distant from the famous rock of Gigralter we had a fine view of it from the Easterly side there are but few buildings on that side, but the town lies on the westerly part of the harbor there has been but little change in its appearance since I was there 4 years ago

The little town is very prettily laid out, the buildings are very neat and the grounds beautifully ornamented with trees which are now thick with green foliage and blossoms. The rock soars above the villages like a huge mountain of stone, on the most conspicuous part, is a telegraph station at the distance of 1400 feet and a dwelling house where we were entertained on an excursion with a party of American Captains and their wives. The rock of Gibralter is more curious in its formation than anything I have ever seen. We have anchored and Capt K and Capt P have gone into town.



Thursday, May 20th, 1858

We left the Harbor at 12 o'clock and headed our course for the broad Atlantic with a fair wind, it is nearly 6 months, since we left it and passed through to the Mediterranean, no one went on shore but Capt Kallock and Capt P- they were very expeditious in their purchases and returned at 11 o'clock AM we had a fine chance through the Straits and lost sight, at 6 o'clock PM, of Capas Trafalgar and Spartell. We had a fine breeze and we passed rapidly on, at the rate of 11 knots and hour till midnight, the wind then moderated and changed to NEast. It is a fine day and a fair wind but a heavy swell from the Westward which makes her pitch a little.

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DISCOVERING OUR COLLECTIONS

Winter White Exhibit - December 4 to February 28



Do you know that the Cohasset Historical Society's collection currently amounts to over 28,000 accessioned objects, books, photographs and archival documents? We continue to accept a myriad of Cohasset-related items. We are the custodian and safe keeper of all things Cohasset! The Society's headquarters for the past 12 years at 106 South Main Street has allowed us not only to grow our collection but also to display significant portions on a rotating basis.

Our first exhibit at the Pratt Building was on historic Cohasset signs, some of them about or as large as 10 feet long. The beautiful first floor, with its handsome paneled reception area and two large exhibit rooms, lends itself to extensive elaborate shows. Our exhibit of over 50 World War I photographs taken by Margaret Hall and the Civil War exhibit with artifacts, military records and fashions from the Civil War era were rivaled only by our Wedding Gown exhibit where over 30 of our historic wedding gowns were displayed in all their glory. Last year's winter exhibit was truly exceptional. A devoted committee displayed fashions and artifacts that depicted what life would have been like on a Cohasset estate during the first and second decade of the twentieth century. We chose to highlight "The Ridges," a Cohasset estate owned by the Bigelow and later the Logan family, for which we have many interior and exterior photographs that illustrate how the wealthy Bigelow family lived during this time period.

This winter's exhibit is "Winter White," a selection of white fashions and artifacts, along with numerous black and white photographs. Among these will be christening and wedding gowns, quilts, and winter photographs, many of which have not been on exhibit before. A special portion of the exhibit will be select items from our Richardson White collection. This collection, given to the Society in 1966, was significant in establishing the Independence Gown Museum which was once located at 24 South Main Street, now the location of Baked.

Highlighted will be the 1865 silk ball gown purchased by Maria L. Barnes in Paris for \$100. Donated to the Society in 1982 by Maria's great-granddaughter, this gown has traveled to New York to be part of the Nassau County Museum of Art special exhibit of French fashion. Pictured here, the gown is made from white silk taffeta and is embellished

with red ribbons, lace, net, fringe and pearl beads.



Dress designer Madame Vignon was known for her ability to use bright colors while keeping the overall affect soft and feminine. She had an elite clientele and was patronized by Empress Eugenie, wife of Napoleon III.

We also would like to document last winter's historic snowfall. If you have photographs to share, please email them to us or drop them by the Pratt Building. A selection will be included in the display and then added to our archive.

"Winter White" will run from December 4 to February 28.

Discovering Our Collections, The Gracie Banner

We have received a very generous donation in the amount of \$1,000 from Carol Litchfield, the great-granddaughter of Grace Everett Tower, which is earmarked for the restoration of the Gracie pennant. As you may recall, the schooner-yacht Gracie was built in Cohasset, and named for Grace. Carol has agreed to match any further donations we receive between now and June 1, 2016, which is Grace Everett Tower's birthday.

While simple restoration is approximately \$3,500, the ability to display the pennant is significantly more costly. Restoration alone will restrict how the pennant can be displayed. Mounting and framing will allow the pennant to be viewed and moved without incurring additional damage.

Conserving an object of this size requires many hours of work and the appropriate archival materials to mount and frame the object. Due to its size, mounting and framing materials will require custom manufacturing which drives up costs.

We are very appreciative of the fact that Carol is taking leadership of this restoration project.

MEMBER PROFILE - LUCILLE McLOUGHLIN HORNBY by Paula Morse

Will volunteers (and wonders) never cease!

Lucille, who shared the Volunteer Award in 2014 with Martha Horsefield, serves the Society well as bookkeeper and member of the Finance Committee. Her ties to Cohasset are strong and go back to summers spent here with her five siblings at the O'Malley's, their grandfather's home on Jerusalem Road,



and then at the McLoughlin's, their parents' home, with an Atlantic Avenue address that Lucille's father Maurice renamed Lothop Lane. In her teens, she crewed at the Cohasset Yacht Club and as a junior member, played tennis at the Cohasset Golf Club. Most telling, her fondest memories of that time were her frequent visits to the Paul Pratt Memorial Library.

Growing up in Brooklyn on Park Slope, Lucille attended Catholic schools through

college at Manhattanville, where she majored in math. Yale followed for two more years, and then in 1963, after training at IBM in computer programmer

(a new field at this time), she worked at the Service Bureau Corporation, an IBM subsidiary, altogether for ten years.

ber of the Finance Committee. Lucille and her husband Bob (they married in 1972), a semi-retired lawyer and municipal judge in Far Hills, New Jersey, have three children: Lucy, a Financial Times correspondent in Beijing; Catharine, Budget Director in the Baker administration; and Rob, who builds and maintains railroad cars for a tourist/freight system in New Hope, PA. For about 20 years in the 80s and 90s, with her brother-in-law Tom Hall, Lucille developed an interactive Excel program and gave workshops on health manpower requirements, which meant extended trips to India, Indonesia, Thailand, and other Southeast Asian countries.

Traveling continues to be high on Lucille's list of interests. She is a voracious reader as well, mainly of history and biography and murder mysteries, but also the *New York Times*, *the New Yorker* and the *Financial Times* (of course). Glastonbury Abbey, too, draws her on a regular basis.

Since Lucille began spending more and more time in Cohasset, it was only natural that Kathy, who already knew she enjoyed computers and numbers, would convince her to become involved in the Society. This has proved to be a natural fit, with the Society taking full advantage of her skills. In answer to our usual profile question, Lucille's wish for the Society is that we continue to flourish and have a growing endowment.

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
